



What do I look for in a fishing rod.

There are so many different rods for so many different species of fish where does one begin? The first thing when choosing a fishing rod is to know what specie you are targeting. For the purpose of this article we are going to refer to walleye fishing.

A fishing rod is made up of three main components, the shaft, the handle and the eyes. When it comes to the shaft, other than the material, the way

manufacture's design the shaft of a rod depends on two categories the action and the speed.

The stiffness of a rod is called the action, heavy, medium or light, or a combination of two. The speed of a rod is where the rod bends, slow, medium or fast. Slow rods or a wimpy rod bends closer to the handle. A medium rod has a fairly strong backbone and bends about halfway up the rod. A fast action rod has a very strong backbone and mostly only bends nearer to the tip.

The handle of a fishing rod is a personal preference. All I can tell you is to pick the one that feels the best for you. The thicker the handle, the less feel you will have for detecting a bite from a fish.

The eyes of a fishing rod are also very important whether they're ceramic or metal makes a difference on what you are doing, example metal eyes chew up Nanofill line and fire line chew up ceramic eyes.

So what type of rod do I choose? Again it depends on how you fish. There are about six ways to catch walleye: rigging, jigging, ripping, spinning, cranking and bobber fishing. If you do not wish to buy a different rod for each of these methods and only want one rod for everything, then I suggest a 6 ½' medium action, medium speed, spinning rod. Don't forget quality comes with price.

If you want different rods: A rod that is used for rigging should allow you to fight a fish with a small hook. For this you need a rod with a soft tip. My choice would be a 7' medium light action, medium speed, spinning rod. A jigging rod varies, depending on if you're using light jigs or heavy jigs. If you're using small jigs that bend out easily, a 7' medium light action, fast speed, spinning rod works well. For other jigs 6 ½' use a medium action, fast speed. Ripping is a method of jigging spoons or any thing like a jigging rapala that you need to jig aggressively. For this I suggest a 6 ½' or 7' medium action, medium speed, spinning rod. For spinning and cranking I use a bait caster rod. I find the best choice is a 7' to 8 ½' medium action, medium speed. For bobber fishing the longer the rod the better. I use a 8' medium light action, medium speed spinning rod.

I hope these suggestions help you when choosing your next fishing rod but keep in mind they are just suggestions. Choosing a fishing rod should also be a personal choice, because it will probably be with you for awhile. Good luck and good fishing. RWL

Barotrauma Dvice

Last year the South Saskatchewan Wildlife Association joined up with the Saskatchewan Walleye Trail to promote the use of our device for catch and release in deeper water. The SWT purchased 300 barotrauma devices, one for each of their members.

This year the SSWA conducted a survey on how many teams were actually using these devices and out of 150 teams in the Last Mountain Fall Walleye Classic over half of them we're using our devices. Some would say that this is quite an accomplishment to go from zero to half of the teams using it. I on the other hand think we still have some work to do. No matter how you look at it, it is a simple little tool that will have a very positive impact on conservation and the SSWA will continue to promote this project.

The organizer of the Last Mountain Fall Walleye Classic must have liked the program because he posted our letter on their webpage, so I thought we would share it with you.

I would like to personally thank you for supporting our barotrauma device conservation program.

Our organization, the South Saskatchewan Wildlife Association, started this conservation program a few years ago in which we designed, built and handed out these devices with the intent to educate. Our goal was to distribute enough barotrauma devices that propagation would take over and anyone practicing catch-and-release in deeper water would use this device. But with any project like this we need help to move it forward.

The SSWA approached the directors of the SWT at their annual general meeting early last year, they were not only interested in this program but were also very excited to take part. They wanted each member of the Walleye Trail to have one of these devices. It is because of this insight that all members of the trail now have one. For the SSWA, this is very important in helping us reach our goal.

I believe that the anglers in the trail are some of the best in this country, which, in my opinion, makes them stewards for the environment. Other anglers look up to them. When we see any conservation project like this, my hope is we again take on the challenge and promote.

Once again I'd like to thank you Doug for being part of this conservation program. Any time that we can be of assistance, please feel free to contact us. We hope to do this conservation program again next year. RWL

On June 21, 2018, 9 young shooters and two national coaches representing Canada Headed to Suhl Germany to compete in the annual ISSF Junior World Cup. Three shotgun, four rifle and two pistol shooters filled the roster. Long time SSWA junior member Talia Park competed in the 10 meter air pistol event. Competing were 761 athletes from 61 countries in 15 Olympic shooting events plus a number of non Olympic events. This was a tremendous growth opportunity in developing shooting skills, meeting people from other countries and discovering the culture of a foreign country. Having the luxury of being supported first hand by our Canadian National Pistol Coach Lisa Borgerson provided her with new skills she wont soon forget. CANADIAN FIREARM SAFETY CERTIFICATION AND SASK HUNTER EDUCATION YOUTH CERTIFICATION.

THE MOOSE JAW FIREARM SAFETY/HUNTER EDUCATION INSTRUCTOR GROUP continues to provide classes enabling youth and adults to achieve the required certification to obtain a POSSESSION AND ACQUISITION LICENSE (PAL OR RPAL) and SASK HUNTER EDUCATION CERTIFICATION.

NOTE: * ONE MUST BE 18 YEARS OLD TO APPLY FOR A PAL. Students younger than 18 minimum age 12 who pass the Cdn Firearm Safety course are given documentation to save until they are 18 which proves they passed the course.

The MJFAS/HED Instructor Group has recently modified their method of delivery of services. This is the format we now follow:

1. We teach the CFSC, review of the online SASK HUNTER ED COURSE, provide hands on Firearm instruction and administer the SHED comprehensive written and Practical Handling test, the CFSC Written and Practical Test on a Friday evening and Saturday am/pm . (8 hr CFSC plus SHED Review and Testing totalling around 11.5-12 hours)
2. We want our students to FIRST do their Sask Hunter Ed Online go www.saskhuntered.ca, click on online courses, register with your credit card, do the 12 chapters. When you have passed your 12 chapter on line course and printed off your report card you can register on our website for one of our two day courses. Google MJHuntered google sites. The website gives you directions how to do the Registration and payment for the 2 day course.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR AWARDS

1. Must be a current member prior to the catch or kill of trophy
 2. All trophies entered must be taken within Saskatchewan in the current year. Fish caught in border lakes that recognize a Saskatchewan Licence also count as caught within Sask.
 3. It is the responsibility of the owner, to enter their trophy to the SSWA's Awards Committee.
 4. All fish and game birds taken must be weighed on a digital scale by a neutral person.
 5. Big game animals must be scored by Boone & Crocket, Henry Kelsey and Pope & Young standards.
 6. Big game must be scored by an official scorer.
 - 7.a. BEST BIG GAME ANIMAL TAKEN WITH A RIFLE (Rifle Trophy)
b. BEST BIG GAME ANIMAL TAKEN WITH A MUSKET (Black Powder Trophy)
a. and b. calculated by the Henry Kelsey minimum score divided into the actual score, multiplied by 100 = percentage. eg. $(165/173 \times 100 = 104.84\%)$
 8. JR HUNTERS 16 AND UNDER
 9. JR CHAMPION ANGLER: One Fish Best Weight
(Must be 12 years of age or under when fish is caught.)
 10. NOVICE CHAMPION ANGLER: One Fish Best Weight
(Must be 13-16 years of age when fish is caught.)
Jr and Novice trophies will be calculated by the SSWA Minimum Qualifying Weight divided into the actual weight, multiplied by 100 = percentage. eg. (Walleye 2.7kg divided by 1.6kg=168% or in imperial weights 5.9lb divided by 3.5=168%).
- SSWA MINIMUM QUALIFYING WEIGHTS:**
Walleye 1.6kg 3.5lb; Pike 2.9kg 6.4lb; Perch 0.29kg 0.65lb; White Fish 1.13kg 2.5lb; Rainbow 1.13kg 2.5lb; Brook 0.45kg 1.0lb; Lakers 2.6kg 5.7lb; LmBass 1.09kg 2.4lb.
11. ADULT CHAMPION ANGLER 17 YEARS OF AGE AND OVER: The total weight of three fish species with a combination including: 1 Pike; 1 Walleye; 1 Lake Trout; 2 Whitefish; 2 Rainbow Trout; 2 Brook Trout; 2 Largemouth Bass; or 3 Perch.

Range

Range Officers

Range Officers for the SSWA are Allen Miller, Kelly Martin, Allen Dyck, Don Park, Paul Moerike, Jesse Chase

South Saskatchewan Wildlife Association Range Rules

All firearms and ammunition must be approved by range officers.

Only rifles allowed are rim fire .22. Black powder firearms, Centre fire rifles and Shotguns of any kind will not be allowed..

1) Allowed ammunition to be fired on the range are cartridges with solid lead and lead core copper jacketed bullets.

a) Reloaded ammunition is allowed. It is the shooter's responsibility to ensure the safety of such ammunition. **The SSWA will not be held responsible**

b) No military ammunition allowed.

2. Ammunition being fired must not have a muzzle energy exceeding 600 ft lbs., Velocity squared times bullet weight(in grains) divided by 450240= ft lbs. muzzle energy.

3. Commands of the range officer will be obeyed at all times.

4. Guests will be allowed only once.

(for insurance, a SSWA membership is required to be on the range)

5. Hearing and eye protection must be worn on firing line.

6. When the Red range light is on, firearms may be uncased, loaded and discharged at the target down range.

7. No handling of firearms when the Green light is on. Magazine or cylinder may only be loaded when the firearm is in use.

(one firearm and one magazine allowed)

8. One firearm is allowed to be on the table at each firing point. Other firearms must remain in the shooters gun chase, or be left in a locked gun case off the firing line.

9. Holsters or speed rigs are not permitted on the range.

10. If there is only one member on the firing line, another individual must be present.

11. During a power failure and if the emergency backup lights fail. These procedures must be followed.

a) Do not Panic

b) Remove your finger from the trigger immediately.

- c) Do not move from fire line position.
- d) Keep firearm pointed down range.
- e) Do not try to disarm your firearm.
- f) A range officer equipped with a flashlight will instruct each shooter on the firing line.
- g) Shooters on the firing line will disarm their firearm with the assistance of the range officer.

12. Standing position only. Shooting with a bench rest or sitting position will be at the discretion of the range officer.

13. When the **Green Light** is on, do not handle your firearm and stand back from the fire line.

14. Do not load your firearm until the range officer gives the command.
(**a maximum of five cartridges for each set**)

15. A firearm is considered loaded if there is a cartridge in the chamber or in the magazine.

16. All uncased revolvers must have the cylinder open and unloaded. All semi-automatics must have the slide locked open and the magazine removed. This rule should be followed when showing the firearm.

17. On completion of firing at the target, the shooter must make their firearm safe and set it on the table pointing down range with the cylinder open or the slide locked open and the magazine removed. Stand back from the firing line and wait for the green light before you move forward.

18. Keep your finger off the trigger when raising and lowering the firearm to or from your shooting position. This is to avoid accidentally shooting anything other than the target. **Contact the trigger only when your firearm is pointing at the target.**

19. No food, beverages or smoking allow on the range.

20. No alcohol or drugs allowed.

21 Safe operation of the range is the responsibility of the range officer.

22. Club guns will be used for orientation to shoot and training or for Guests. (**as per article #4**)

23. If there are a large number of shooters using the range, a time limit of 30 minutes or less per shooter may be imposed at the discretion of the range officer.

24. All incidents or accidents that occur at the SSWA range will be reported to the range officer immediately. They will investigate and submit a report to the executive of the SSWA within 48 hours of the incident or accident.
